It was the first anniversary of the Humboldt Broncos tragedy over the weekend. The issue of the organ donation was also put in the spotlight. One of the hockey players, Logan Boulet, who died in the Saskatchewan bus crash year ago, decided to donate his organs a week before the accident. He saved 6 lives by donating his organs. What soon has followed has been called the Logan Boulet Effect. Canadian Blood Services estimates that within two months of Boulet's death, more than 150,000 people registered to become organ donors. On April 8th, every student in FVAA dressed up in green clothes or jerseys to remember and to show respect to the Broncos hockey team and to remind us how we can also change so many people's lives by donating our organs. 


Chaplain's Corner

Mission Trip 2019

“Hey Guys!” This past spring break, 19 students and 4 sponsors journeyed down to Belize in Central America for 10 days to serve the community there and demonstrate the love of God through volunteer work. During our trip, we focused on sharing our stories and words of wisdom on the broadcast Faith FM, spreading happiness and love to the local children by running a VBS program, and working on building another classroom for the growing Billy White SDA School. We worked alongside students from Parkview Adventist Academy and local men who worked at the site. We demonstrated teamwork and built up our muscles by passing down numerous 30 pound cinder blocks and even heavier bags of dry cement down human chains. We laboured diligently clearing out stubborn rocks and painting the school’s walls with vibrant shades of aqua. Together with around 75 energetic elementary students we sang songs like This is the Day in Spanish, performed plays about the woman who was healed through her faith after touching Jesus’ robe and the power of Jesus when He said the words “Be Still!”, and did crafts to reminds the kids about the lessons we instilled in their hearts.
